

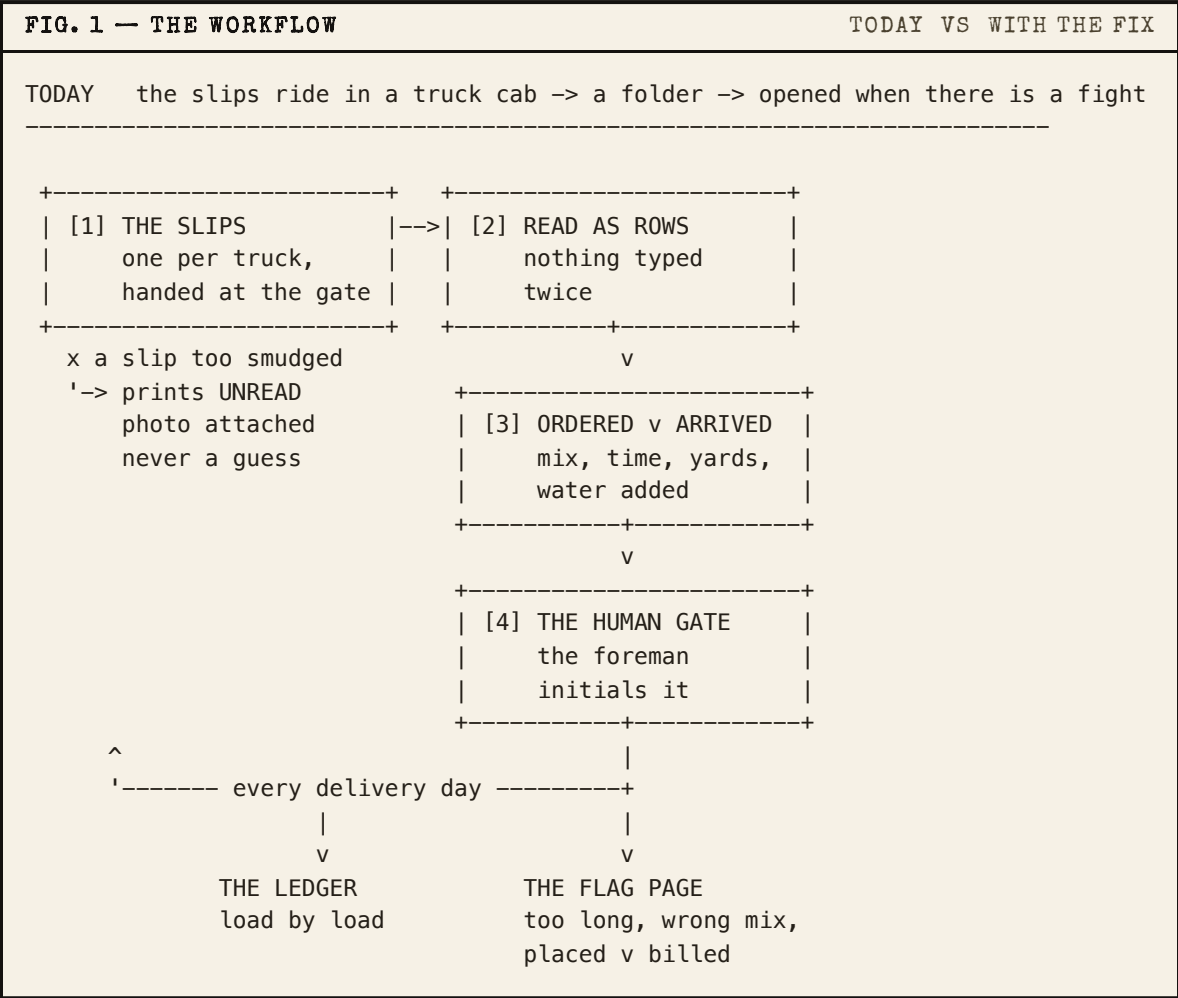


A SAME-DAY CHECK ON THE CONCRETE THAT SHOWED UP

The Delivery Ticket Ledger

Every truck of concrete that shows up gets checked
against what was ordered, the same day.



THE PAIN

what we found, and where

Every truck leaves a paper slip in the foreman’s hand. Nobody reads them as a set. The strength test comes back four weeks later, and by then the only record of what actually happened is four people’s memory of a Tuesday.

THE ARTIFACT

what you actually get

One page per delivery day. Every truck is a row: ticket number, the concrete that was ordered against the concrete that arrived, the time it was mixed, the time it reached the site, the minutes in between, how much, and any water added. Then the totals and three flags — trucks that waited too long, trucks that brought the wrong concrete, and the gap between what went in the ground and what was billed.

The promise: A slip too smudged to read prints UNREAD, with the photo attached. It never guesses a number for a ticket it could not read.

THE HUMAN GATE

where it stops and asks

Mrs. Wilson hands the page over and says where to look. The foreman finds the load and calls the plant himself. Nothing is sent, filed or transmitted by the workflow.

What that feels like: He is holding the page for four seconds before he reaches for the phone. That is the whole gate — a person read it, and a person decided.

BEFORE & AFTER

step by step, keyed to Fig. 1

TODAY AT THEIR DESK	AFTER THE FIX
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THE STACK

what does the work

- reads a photo or a scan of the paper slip
- checks it against the concrete that was ordered
- does the clock arithmetic in plain code, never a guess
- prints one page and emails it

INTEGRATIONS & DELIVERY

what it touches

the office scanner, or a photo emailed to a saved address · the order sheet from the job file · the monthly totals from the billing sheet

SPECIFICATIONS

- The concrete that went in the ground has a record before the trucks are cold
- Concrete that was placed but never billed shows up as found money
- The wrong concrete is caught on the day, not at the four-week test
- The monthly total becomes the honest waste number nobody currently has

AVAILABILITY

GREEN

The reading pattern is the shipped document pipeline. The clock arithmetic is plain code. The delivery is email and a PDF, both proven.

WHO IT’S FOR

The owner, or whoever argues with the concrete plant

ALSO SEE

and...
The Notice Clock, for the same shop’s unpaid jobs

ORIGIN

Slate #4 of the construction run — Bryan’s pick, and the most filmable on the slate.

Start with the audit.

One pass through how these papers actually move in your office. A price before anything starts, and the \$100 comes off the fix.

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
